Queen of Oklahoma SPINS GOLD

I first met *Carter Sampson* about a decade ago. A friend had turned me on to her music and I immediately fell in love with her song, Queen of Oklahoma.

t the time we were only booking an occasional local musician on the morning show, so I was thrilled when Carter accepted the invitation to make the early morning trek for an appearance on KUSH. She arrived in the camper she'd been touring the area in, step-brother in tow. Not only did I get to meet the "queen" that day, but it was the start of a relationship with her and her

Carter's songs speak the words many of us can't seem to find. Her latest album, Gold, is chocked full of lifetelling songs. When I met with Carter to interview her for this article, I had only heard a few cuts from the new album. Little did I know, many of the questions written on my page could be answered by absorbing the lyrics of her

Born in Stephens County, Oklahoma, Carter and her younger brother grew up with a guitar-playing dad and a creative mom. "I'm a lot like my dad," Carter said. "He played in a band in high school and college and [growing up] I thought he was just the coolest dude in the world." He taught her to play guitar and exposed her to much of the music she still embraces today. "A lot of the reason I play music is because of him," Carter continued. "I always thought; because he gave me his record collection and how he'd wake me up to watch someone on Austin City Limits, that he was my biggest musical influence. But I've switched on that. It was really my mom, by default almost, because she was always listening to music in the car – and we were stuck there," she laughed. "Mom had a special way of listening to music, too. She would play an album over and over again until it was

dead." The songs of Bonnie Raitt, Dwight Yokum and Jimmy Buffet made up some of the soundtrack of Carter's youth.

Carter began performing at a very early age while enrolled in Miss Hickman's School for Music. Her mom likes to tell the story about watching four-year-

old Carter on stage and how all the other little girls were backed up from the microphone.

Not Carter, though. A natural performer, she held the microphone between her little hands.

"I feel like that was my first sweet taste of the stage," Carter admitted.

By the time she was in high school, Carter had formed her first band – Plain Jane. "I was really into all the riot girl stuff – screaming girl bands. I still love it to turn it up when I'm in a certain

mood," she said. "But I also love jazz. My mom's mom was one of the first women to get a degree in music at OU. She had an Ella Fitzgerald album which I loved. Then my mom gave me a Billie Holiday record and I would play that when I felt really sad."

While Carter and her mom are very close, there was a time when she felt her mom was trying to "ruin her life," like when she sent her to the "White Gloves and Party Manners" class. Nine-year-old Carter spent her Saturdays, for what seemed to be an eternity, learning proper manners. The highlight of the class for Carter was during the fashion show when she walked down the runway in a silver dress, throwing gold confetti. "It made all the manner stuff worthwhile," she laughed. "I realize now that mom wasn't really trying to ruin my life, she was setting me up for success."

Like so many strong-minded teens, Carter counted down the days until she turned 18; she couldn't wait to test

her wings. Shortly after her much-anticipated birthday, Carter and a friend went to Europe for three weeks. She loved the experience and has traveled back to play several times since. In June she will tour the U.K. with a fellow-singer/songwriter, Amelia White.

Carter came back home and attended college for a while before striking out on her own by moving to Boston to gather life experiences. She learned a lot during that time – waitressing, bar tending and busking in the subway. She also learned that no matter how far she went, she had the support and love of her mom. "I'm grateful to have always had that safety net," Carter said. To this day, Carter's mom remains her number one fan.

Several years ago she started the OKC Rock and Roll Girls Camp. Carter had visited and volunteered at one in Portland, OR. Liking what she saw, she decided to try it in Oklahoma. "I would have loved an opportunity do something like that when I was a kid, so I wanted to give that opportunity to girls now," Carter said.

The camp was a hit! Now, after a three-year hiatus due to the pandemic, Carter and crew are excited to bring it back in July this year. She's also thrilled about its new location – Camp Trivera, a Girl Scout camp near the zoo in OKC. The camp consists of 50 girls, 8 – 17, and a host of volunteers. Not only do they learn how to play an instrument and how to form a band and collaborate to write a song, they learn life skills to help empower them to be who they are. At the end of the week, they get to perform with their band on the stage of the Tower Theatre in OKC.

"The Tower Theatre is a pretty cool first gig," Carter said with a laugh.

As I mentioned earlier, much can be learned about Carter by delving into the lyrics of her songs. Her new album, *Gold*, is taking the Americana Chart by storm, debuting at #24 and at this writing; it has risen to #15. It's so good that it's difficult to have any one favorite song.

Here's my take on the songs, along with some tidbits about/from Carter.

The title cut, *Gold*, is a beautiful love letter to her mother. "I just wanted her to know she did a good job and that my brother and I are going to be ok – I'm going to be ok," Carter said. Its lyrics, "I'll be alright momma, 'cause you made

me out of gold..." grips the heart of every mother longing to know the child they've done their best to raise, will be ok.

Home reflects her time on the road, playing gig after gig. "Gave up a lot to live a life like this...for 90 minutes in a hot spotlight..." The song speaks of her journey as an emerging soul, "I'm not sure where my heart is, but I'm starting to find my way home..." It also gives another nod to her mother – "I can hear you talking in my ear...don't forget who you are... stand up straight and you'll go far..."

Drunk Text - This song title and opening lyrics can be a bit misleading... "I sent you a drunk text and I meant it..." In reality it's a love song to her significant other, and fellow singer/songwriter, Erik "The Viking" Oftedahl. "Here we are...I even let you play my guitar..." she croons, "I wouldn't have nothin' if I didn't have you..."

Erik's the best," Carter said. "He's thoughtful... always so positive and helps balance me out - and he makes me laugh."

Black Blizzard came from Carter's curiosity about the Dust Bowl. "I didn't really know much about it, other than what I'd been taught in school," she admitted. After a little research Carter was able to conjure up lyrical images of what it was like "living in a black blizzard..." Kyle Reid worked his own special magic into the song, creating whirling notes, drawing the listener into the storm.

Yippie Yi Yo is almost like eavesdropping on a couple of cowgirls riding the range, confiding about their "man" trou-

bles. "What did he say? I can't believe he said that to you..." It also sends a message of perseverance to women. "It's hard being a woman today...you've got to get back on your pony and ride anyway," she sings.

"I've been joking that it's my feminist cowgirl's song," Carter laughed. "I don't really write protest[type] songs, but my views are definitely reflected in my lyrics."

Can't Stop Me Now would make a good anthem for just about anyone, but certainly for women like Carter striving to "make it" in the music world. "Here I am, long time gone, I've traveled those miles and I've sang those songs..." It also speaks of Carter's passion to continue to travel the world, being the best version of who she is. "I wanna go someplace new...my bags are always packed...I'm gonna do what I'm gonna do...can't stop me now..."

Fingers to the Bone is a tribute to hard work and specifically to the man who built the house where she and Erik live. According to Carter, the story is that he'd been told "money doesn't grow on trees" but discovered it did when he planted the pecan orchard behind their house. It was a lucrative endeavor which proved to some, that money does indeed grow on trees.

Today is Mine is a song about taking time for yourself something Carter finds necessary to be able to create and thrive. "Today is mine...the morning belongs to me...I'm gonna do what I want to do...be my own company..." One of those things she loves to do is reading. "My mom was a seamstress, and she often would play an audio book while she worked," Carter recalled. "I'm sure that had an influence on me, because I've always loved to read." She also loves shopping for vintage clothing and unique items. "I collect a lot of things," she said with a laugh. "I love anything Elvis or Dolly. My house has an eclectic mix of things."

In Pray & Scream, Carter once again uses her lyrics to paint a picture of life in tornado country. "I'm gonna pray, I'm gonna scream...why does this thing gotta come down on me..." However, like many of her other lyrics, the listener may find a message about an inner struggle such as self-doubts or depression. "Sometimes I will write a song and then later realize it has a deeper meaning," Carter said. "I guess that's the Universe trying to tell me something."

The last song on the album, There's Always Next Year, was released at the end of 2020. It was written as a message of hope for all those struggling through the pandemic. "I know these months were hard on you...you didn't live life like you wanted to...don't beat yourself up for letting yourself down..."

"I felt it was timely, so I went ahead and put it out there," Carter said. "Since it's still pertinent, it made the final cut on the album."

"We didn't do great, we did the best that we could...hallelujah there's always next year..."

Well, Carter, we think you did great by giving the world your heart in these songs. And we look forward to see what you come up with next year and the next...and the next... Thank you for sharing your "Gold."








A significant amount of our volunteers are retired from their major roles as nurses, teachers, police officers, mechanics, military and a variety of other vocations. Together they dedicate themselves to sharing their approach, knowledge, and life experience, continuing to make a positive impact on all those they can reach.

The benefits, for participants and other volunteers, to be on a team laced with retired professionals and potential members are obvious. However my curiosity was aroused –

What's in it for them?

According to Second Wind Movement (and several other sources), the advantages of volunteering after retirement are exponential. Not only do they get to maintain their sense of purpose (if they choose an organization that is meaningful to them), they put themselves in a position to grow new relationships with people that share their passion. Other benefits include keeping their mind sharp, continuing to learn new skills, promoting happiness and longevity – and my person favorite – the opportunity to bridge generation gaps.

If I stood in the middle of the barn at The Right Path and looked for the brightness light, there would be no doubt that I would be staring directly at Leslie Kirkland, founder of Right Path. She is a retired physical therapist who has retired from retirement to once again take the reins of The Right Path. This non-profit organization is designed for riders to participate at no cost. The programs – William's Walk (serving children with disabilities and challenges) and Hooves on the Ground (serving the Veterans community), started with her dedication and continue to grow because of her drive to leave a legacy that is about bringing people and horses together as a team to serve others.

As the Executive Director, Leslie has created an environment where details matter; standards are understood and applied, as well as reviewed if necessary. Nothing is taken for granted when it comes to the safety of the participants, horses, volunteers and staff.

Even as the child is asking a hundred questions, Leslie is studying their every move, taking note of their responses, looking for ways to advance their social and cognitive skills, then communicating with a team to make a plan of action and celebrate the progress. She also takes time to grow their life skills, confidence, and self-worth, while maintaining her own. She brings all that positivity through teaching them horsemanship.

Armed with a cause, the illumination cast by Leslie, her team of volunteers, and the staff, is truly inspiring. It is no wonder that so many retired professionals choose the Right Path as their "make a difference" destination.

As a child, I spent lots of time with my grandparents, soaking up their combined knowledge. Even as the herd of siblings scattered, I gravitated towards my elders. Now as an adult, it has been over 20 years since all of my grandmothers passed on, and my horse whisperer Grandpa Dale Strickland was laid to rest last year.

I believe they would be both happy and proud that I landed at a horse ranch, surrounded by volunteers focused on serving the disabled community and veterans.

I would like to send an abundance of appreciation to the pillars in our community who weren't satisfied with having acquired knowledge, but have chosen to share it with the next generation.

Since the inception of the morning show in 2008, "Momma says..." has been a part of the morning show script. Joe Naifeh was one of the first business owners to believe and support the crazy idea of a locally produced morning talk show, featuring a completely "green" radio host and her friend. Not knowing what to expect, he accepted a guest spot. Soon he became a "regular" - delivering food from Naifeh's kitchen. Homemade chicken

and noodles, tabouli, cabbage rolls, sandwiches - whatever delights "Momma said" - were hand-delivered for us to sample on the air. It was a great time to be a KUSH Girl! I not only gained weight during that time, I gained a friendship with Joe and Momma.

Some of my favorite memories are of Momma milling about the restaurant, taking orders, and teasing me about something I'd said on the radio. More often than not,

> Joe would be peeking out from the kitchen while he cooked.

As Momma sightings became rarer, I'd always ask Joe about Momma and he'd asked how my momma was doing. A trip to Naifeh's was kinda like visiting a favorite relative - you knew you were going to be in good company while having something delicious to eat.

But as we all know, things change. The pandemic was hard on businesses - especially small "mom & pop" types like Naifeh's. And yet, in spite of any challenges he may have been facing, Joe Naifeh did his best to continue supporting the community any way he could. I witnessed it personally. When others were dropping their advertising, Joe stepped his up - he felt it was important to do something to help a fel-

low small business - the local radio station. This is something I will always remember and be grateful for.

The Naifeh family has left an indelible, "nearly perfect" mark on this community. No doubt we all could learn from their example. Ҝ

fter 10 years of bringing sweet music to the ears of concert goers, the Cimarron Breeze Concert Series has come to a close...sort of. Its host, Cimarron Songbird Monica Taylor, recently announced there isn't going to be a new season of the series of shows. Even with a great cast of volunteers and supporters, it takes a lot of time and preparation to put together the Cimarron Breeze concerts. And although Monica has thoroughly enjoyed hosting the concerts and all that's entailed, ten years seemed like a good time to take a break to focus more on her own musical career. And she has plenty to concentrate on! This past year Monica released a new album, Trains, Rivers & Trails and is set to release another album this summer - A

Red Dirt Ramble, Volume I – a tribute to the pioneers of Red Dirt music. It includes 9 recordings of songs written by Bob Childers, Jimmy LaFave, Don Morris, Tom Skinner, and other Red Dirt artists. With a second tribute album in the works, along with promoting the current ones, Monica and her husband and musical partner Travis Fite will still be filling the air with great music.

The caliber of talent playing concerts at the Old Church has been nothing less than remarkable. The very first concert featured Jimmy LaFave. "Jimmy didn't hesitate in saying yes," Monica recalled fondly. Over the years, he continued to support the endeavor and chose to play there one last time before his death in May, 2017. That show was one

of the most heartfelt and heartbreaking shows I've ever had the privilege to attend. You could literally feel the love permeating the room as he said goodbye through word and song.

It's not uncommon for an artist to come back for a second, third or fourth time (or more) to play at the Old Church. Some of the local "regulars" include the Red Dirt Rangers, Randy Crouch, John Fullbright, The Cherokee Maidens & Sycamore Swing, Parker Millsap, Carter Sampson, Don Morris, Tom Skinner, Wink Burcham, Jacob Tovar, Miss Brown to You, Jared Tyler, Mike McClure, Chuck Dunlap, Nellie Clay, Woodyfest performers...the list goes on and on. All in all, there have been over 320 featured or openingact performers coming in from all over America, Canada, France, the Netherlands and six indigenous Indian nations. With anywhere from 75 to 150 people attending each show, the Cimarron Breeze Concert series has had a total of over 10,000 attendees.

Oh...but did I mention the food? Most of the Cimarron Breeze Concerts started with a gathering of attendees and performers sharing a delicious potluck meal. This alone required a host of volunteers, who became Mon-

ica's "right hands." Some of the amazing volunteers who have been faithful throughout the years are Sage Powell, Scott Sewell, Lory Ferguson, Sarah Barker Huhn, Adam Miller, Travis Fite, and the late Dennis Whiteman. "I couldn't have done it without their help," Monica said. "They're like family – they ARE family."

Not only are volunteers like family, but guests as well. And if you've stayed long enough after the show, you're probably in one of the "family photos" taken at the end of the night.

I feel fortunate to have experienced the magic that happens at the Old Church. There's something really special about listening and feeling the music in the historic church in Perkins. I'm looking forward to more opportunities to feel the Breeze again. According to Monica, Cimarron Breeze shows at the Old Church will continue, just not on a regular basis. Monica will be holding her album (A Red Dirt Ramble -Volume I), release show there in late June and a cast of Woodyfest singer/songwriters will be there for the annual post-Woodyfest show in July.
